Recovery Task Force Origin

- In response to the massive and widespread devastation caused by Hurricane Ian, the Lee Board of County Commissioners voted unanimously to form the Recovery Task Force based on the FEMA National Disaster Recovery Framework.
- The purpose of convening the Recovery Task Force is to collaborate as a community, combining efforts to recover and rebuild in a resilient manner. Initially, the Recovery Task Force will review and endorse priorities for consideration by the State Legislature and provide a unified voice for the interests of Lee County and its residents, businesses, and nonprofits.
- All efforts are going into the development of the ResilientLee Recovery and Resiliency Plan which aims to be a roadmap for a resilient recovery for the whole community.
 - Townhalls are seeking community input to inform the ResilientLee Plan.

- Largest hurricane to make landfall in Lee County and **fifth largest storm in U.S. history.**

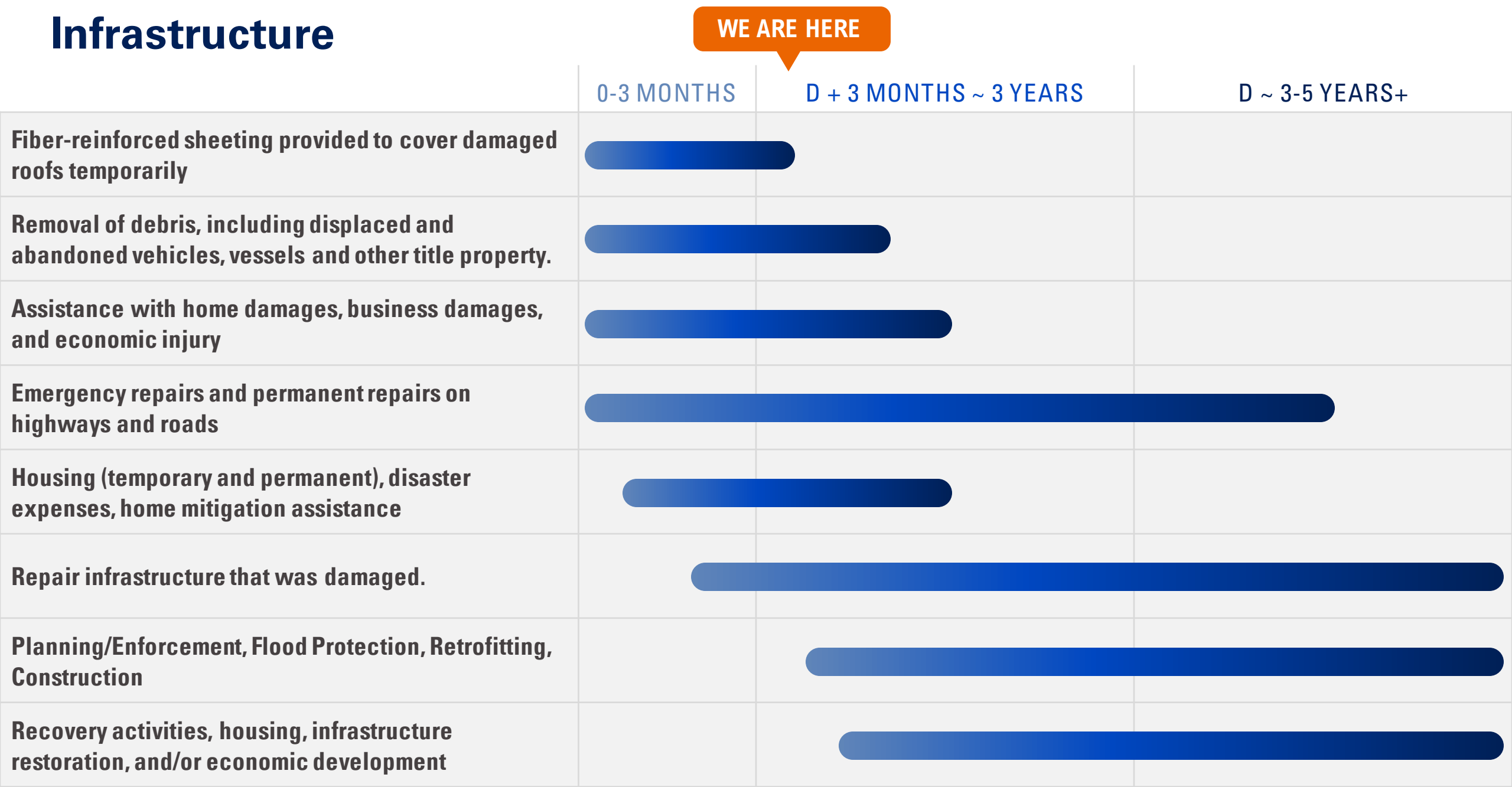
Long Road for Rebuilding Public Infrastructure

- Total damages greatly exceed available funding at the local government level.
- Local governments must go through long process to document damages, identify how infrastructure will be built back, and seek funding through various Federal programs.
- Repairs usually cannot start until approval comes from the Federal agency or the local government forfeits potential funding.
- Going through this process can and usually takes years.
 - Repairs are still being made for Tropical Storm Sandy, Hurricane Irma, and Hurricane Michael.

Examples of Different Programs:

- Federal Highways Administration – Repair and make more resilient most main roads and bridges
- Natural Resources Conservation Service – Remove debris from waterways
- Federal Transit Authority – Damages to public transit
- FEMA Public Assistance – Repair and make more resilient other public infrastructure
- Hazard Mitigation Grant Program – Make infrastructure more resilient

Available Resources

- Lee County's State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) can provide up to \$10,000 to help cover insurance deductibles for qualified residents. For more information concerning SHIP, email SHIPhousing@leegov.com

Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR)

- \$1.1B was announced by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in March 2023
 - Official notification will be provided to Lee County in the coming months
- Lee County is responsible for preparing an Action Plan on how the funds will be spent
- Unmet needs provide the basis for how these funds must be spent
 - CDBG-DR funding will not cover all unmet needs in Lee County for housing, infrastructure, etc.
- 70% of CDBG-DR funds must benefit low- and moderate-income (LMI) areas and people (80% of Area Median Income)
 - Income limit for family of 4 in Lee County = \$64,300



Typical CDBG-DR Activities

- **Housing**

- Repairs and reconstruction of homes
- Assistance finding new housing
- Housing development

- **Infrastructure**

- Repairing and mitigating public infrastructure directly or indirectly impacted by Ian (e.g., increasing underground water infrastructure).

- **Economic Development/Revitalization**

(e.g., workforce training)

- **Planning**

(e.g., emergency operations planning and long-term recovery planning)

- **Public Services**

(e.g., case management, educational campaigns, etc.)

- **Mitigation**

(e.g., home hardening programs or implementing stormwater management best practices)

Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR)

HUD requires an extensive community input process in developing the "Action Plan" due 120 days from the official notification

HUD Action Plan	ResilientLee Recovery & Resiliency Plan
The Action Plan outlining the proposed use of the \$1.1 billion dictated by HUD's rules regarding project eligibility. Will include a 30-day public comment period and additional townhalls to gain public input on what is developed by the County approximately 60-90 days after official notification.	The ResilientLee Recovery & Resiliency Plan will be a comprehensive plan with specific steps identifying recommended initiatives, policy and procedural change recommendations, and projects for the Lee County region to build back more resiliently from Hurricane Ian. Additional input will be sought to receive feedback on the recommended initiatives developed.

CDBG-DR Action Plan to Implementation Estimated Timeline

- **Assuming May 1st (Day 0)**
Estimated release of Federal Register Notice (officially notification)
- **June 30th (Day 60)**
Draft Action Plan released for public comment and additional Town Halls for feedback.
- **July 2023**
Public provides feedback on Action Plan (at least 2 public meetings)
- **August 2023**
Lee County incorporates feedback from public meetings
- **August 29th (Day 120)**
Lee County's deadline to submit the Action Plan to HUD
- **By October 28th (Day 180)**
HUD has 60 days to either approve or provide feedback on the Action Plan
- **Late-2023/Early-2024**
Plan approval from HUD and begin implementation of programs that provide direct support to the community
